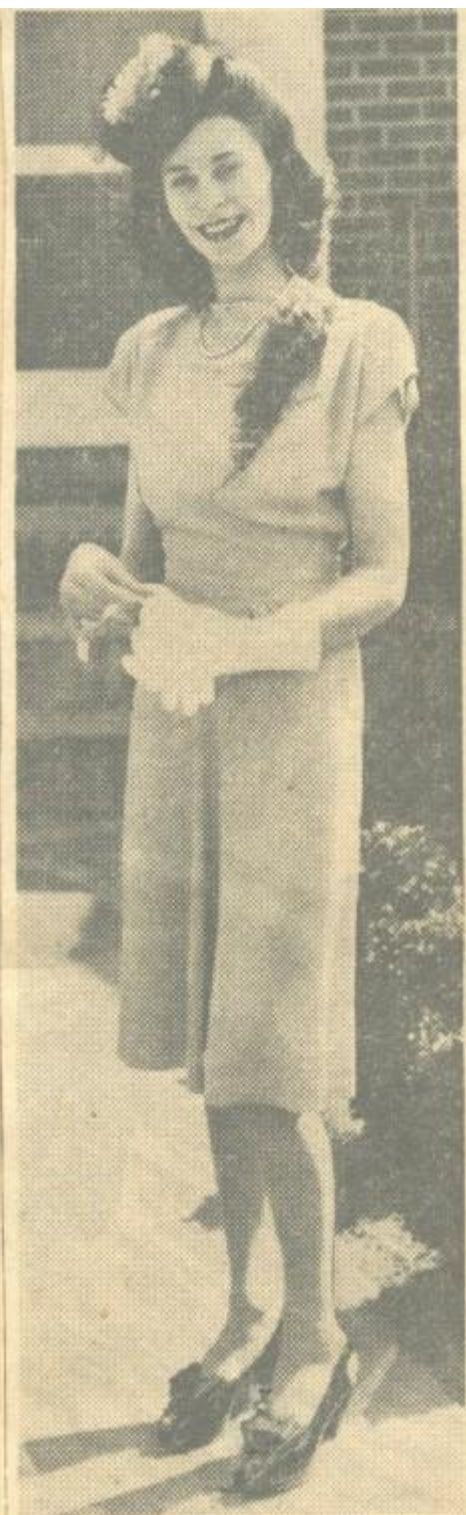
Lori Brix called our message line some months back to share her mother's marvelous story. Joan Greenham Showfety was a young woman when she met a young American soldier, stationed in England during World War II. They married, and in 1946, she crossed the Atlantic to join him in North Carolina. She was one of thousands of young women to arrive in the United States aboard the Queen Mary (and a few other ships commissioned by the US Army) to join their new husbands in the United States in the months following the end of the war.

When we wrote her to see if she had any images, she responded with a wonderful collection of images of her mother and documents from the Queen Mary.



“The newspaper clipping was taken on Joan’s first day in Greensboro, NC—her new home. She said they arrived in Greensboro from New York by train at about 2 in the morning. They went her husband’s brother and sister-in-laws, where they were going to live while they got settled in. Two of her sister-in-laws rustled her out of bed early the next morning to take her shopping. Everything she has on in the picture was purchased by her sister-in-laws so she would have something to wear to church on the following day.”

Joan Greenham Showfety, received this Order from the US Army at her home in England. She arrived in New York Harbor on March 1st 1946.

2. 200 lbs baggage allowance for adults and 50lbs for each child is authorized.

3. Travel by Army or Naval transport, rail and/or motor transportation is authorized.

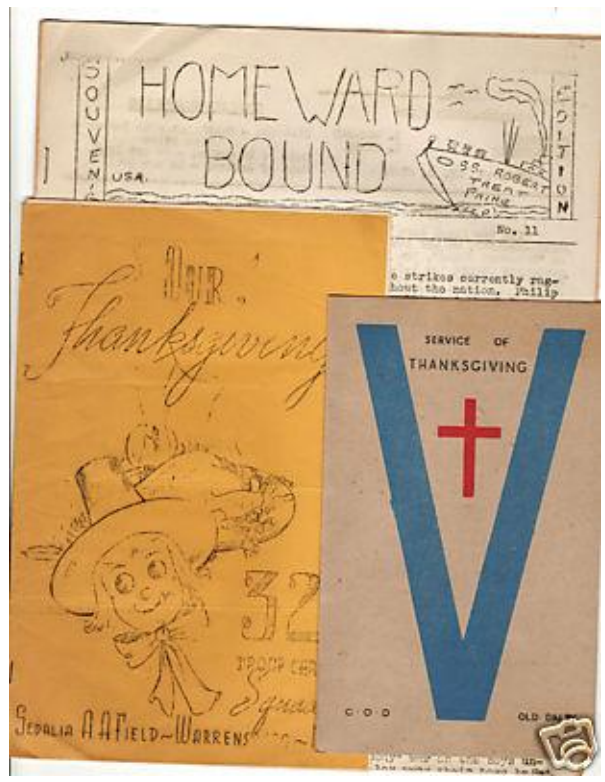
